Many people who have come to work have stayed there. The experienced cadre have spent anywhere between 5 and 15 years. The Principal of the school (Mr Patedar) is also visually challenged.
	Current project effectiveness	Most of the projects that have undertaken are being effectively managed. They have a fully functional Hellen Keller Academy of Education set up under the aegis of Aide et Action (AeA).
	Efficiency of usage of funds	Cannot comment. Did not get to look at their book of accounts. However, we can request for one.
	Benefits to students	High. Many students that have passed out of the school have become self-sufficient.

Other Information	What was your overall opinion about your site visit?	Can continue to work with MPWAB. However, it is necessary that funders have to stay in continuous touch with the custodians to monitor any progress.
	What was the most positive aspect you found?	I was amazed at the commitment and dogged approach towards emancipating visually challenged children.
	What was the most negative aspect you found?	However, they lack of soft skills (that is presentation, being media savvy). They are not properly organized. Subsequently, become prey to inducing communication gaps. Are not proactive.
	Did you talk to anyone else in the community/town about the organization? If you did, what were their opinions?	Most of the people in Indore know about the good work that MPWAB is doing.
